The world is in flux.

The question of identity has troubled humanity for centuries, but now in a technological age of communication, economic crisis and rapid change we are confronted more than ever with the question: who are we?

Thirty-four emerging photojournalists from around the globe respond to this crisis in a variety of creative and thought-provoking ways. Spanning continents, ethnicities and personal boundaries, this exhibition showcases the height of photographic practise combined with the probing insight of quality documentary and first-class journalism. It comes as the conclusion to the internationally acclaimed MA Documentary Photography and Photojournalism course at the London College of Communication, and will take place from 13 December – 09 January.

A cohort of multi-award-winning image makers, this group addresses and challenges the question of identity in the modern world, with approaches ranging from the classically photojournalistic to the contemporary and conceptual, and will take introduce audiences to issues on the international stage, from the Occupy Movement in the US, to the intimate and personal, such as an insight into gender reassignment.

Course Leader John Easterby said: "As we approach the end of an extraordinary twelve month journey, I look at the work produced by the class of 2012 with a sense of wonder and admiration. With a central theme of identity the 2012 MA show, It Is What it Was, brings together the thoughts, ideas and observations of 34 exceptional photographers. Their stories are fresh and original and the manner in which they are presented to the public, contemporary and in some cases, ground breaking.



"Diverse as they are, the stories often reveal the similarities and connections that exist between us all. On one side of the world we see the Brazilian Gaucho community, and on the other, the Samurai Horse Warriors of Fukushima, each in their way fighting to preserve ancient traditions in the face of different threats."

The exhibition will take place in the London College of Communication, an institution specialising in cutting edge media and communications, consistently producing outstanding talents in journalism.

Commenting on the advancing technology available to photographers, which will be showcased at the exhibition in the form of stunning images and multimedia projects, Mr Easterby continued: "Never before has the photographer enjoyed such freedom to draw on multiple resources to communicate. If this is the 5DMkII generation, then they have become much, much more than photographers who occasionally use a bit of sound and video."

A world-leading course in photojournalism, this MA has produced world-class photographers and prize-winners, including Felicia Webb, Marcus Bleasdale, Anastasia Taylor Lind, Jordi Ruiz Cirera and Olivia Arthur.
